### FY2020 Highlights

#### JULY 2019

The findings of a research project by Pallavi Nishith, Ph.D. were published in the July 2019 edition of Cogent Medicine in the article, "Alcohol expectancies in persons with severe mental illness and posttraumatic stress disorder." (<https://doi.org/10.1080/2331205X.2019.1635805>) Dr. Gary Morse, Places for People Vice President of Research and Development, and Dr. Kim T. Mueser, a clinical psychologist and Professor at the Center for Psychiatric Rehabilitation at Boston University, were co-authors of the study.

#### SEPTEMBER 2019

More than 20 Naloxone Rescue kits were installed throughout PpP sites.

As criminal justice reform gained momentum, Places for People staff members took a step back and reviewed ways the organization intersected with the legal system, and took the first steps toward planning how that might look in the future. Twenty-eight members of Places for People program leadership team, including executives, program directors, team leaders and other specialists, gathered at the St. Louis Psychiatric Rehabilitation Center to review the current landscape at a macro- and micro-level, and also considered the future of how community behavioral health intersects with the legal system.

Dr. Gary Morse, Vice President of Research and Development, was the lead author of the article, "Implementing illness management and recovery within assertive community treatment teams: A qualitative study" (<http://dx.doi.org/10.1037/prj0000387>), which was published online by Psychiatric Rehabilitation Journal in September in advance of a future print version. The study assessed the fit between implementing "Illness Management and Recovery" within Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) teams. ACT Teams are specially designed to meet all of the needs of people with the most serious of mental illnesses and the most complex additional challenges. ACT is the highest intensity of care available at Places for People.

#### NOVEMBER 2019

The MO-TAY team was launched. This was a pilot project at Places for People that is directed toward providing support to individuals who are at a transitional age range when they are no longer a child, but not quite an adult yet either. The Missouri Transition-Aged Youth Local Engagement and Recovery program (MO-TAY-LER) serves individuals between the ages of 16-25 who have been diagnosed with a mental illness. The Missouri Department of Mental Health received a five-year grant from SAMHSA to fund the program. The Behavioral Health Network of St. Louis administers the grant, with Places for People providing services in St. Louis City, BJC Behavioral Health providing services in St. Louis County, and Compass Health serving counties west of St. Louis.

Places for People and Attorney General Eric Schmitt hosted a roundtable discussion on November 25 about the Opioid Epidemic and how potential funds from a lawsuit against opioid manufacturers would best be spent to provide the maximum impact and best outcomes for Missourians.

### FY2020 Highlights

#### DECEMBER 2019

At Mental Health America of Eastern Missouri's annual Snow Ball gala, Dr. Gary Morse received the Silver Key Award. The Silver Key Award is presented annually to "individuals or organizations whose contributions to the mental health field demonstrate a devotion to the eradication of stigma that often prevents people from seeking treatment. The award acknowledges the effort, values and ethics that comprise the character of those who support improved treatment and care of people with mental illness."

Thanks to sponsorships and donations collected at the public events, Keys for Keys raised more than \$10,000 to support Places for People's mission to improve the physical and behavioral health of the individuals, families, and communities we serve and those who support the provision of these services.

#### JANUARY 2020

A study by Places for People's Research and Evaluation team explored the relationship between post-traumatic stress symptoms and depressive symptoms among individuals served through a SAMHSA-funded program to provide mental health, substance use, and housing support services to persons experiencing chronic homelessness. The article, "The relationship between PTSD factors and depression in a chronically homeless sample," was published online in The Journal of Social Distress and Homelessness in late September. Authors include Nathaniel Dell, AM, MSW, LCSW, Gary Morse, PhD, and Pallavi Nishith, PhD, of Places for People, and Jin Huang, PhD, of Saint Louis University's School of Social Work.

#### MARCH 2020

Launched phase 1 of COVID response. In the organization's most cautious phase of operation during the COVID-19 pandemic, 80% of persons served were engaged solely by telehealth methods. Four hundred individuals required face-to-face interactions due to severity of symptoms or lack of connectivity to phone and/or internet. Grants from Missouri Foundation for Health, St. Louis MHB, Deaconess Foundation, St. Louis County Humanitarian CARES, HHS Cares, Incarnate Word Foundation, Missouri Coalition for Community Behavioral Healthcare as well as contributions from private businesses and individuals have helped our organization purchase PPE and enhance our telehealth resources. Additionally, MO HealthNet helped Places for People secure 300 Internet hot spots and 300 telehealth devices.

#### MAY 2020

Places for People received a two year, \$4 million grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to expand and enhance access to behavioral health care services, particularly for individuals in St. Louis City and County who are involved in the criminal justice system or those who are at increased risk of criminal legal system involvement.

#### JUNE 2020

Launch of Show Me Hope Team. Funded by FEMA. Places for People is one of the providers participating in Missouri's Show-Me Hope Crisis Counseling Program to support individuals and groups who have been impacted by COVID-19.

#### JUNE 2020

CEO, Joe Yancey publishes a letter to the community addressing institutional racism, racial disparity and empowering change.
